The Trust honours the life of Sir Albert Coates through publications, education programmes and associated educational awards.

ABOUT THE ALBERT COATES MEMORIAL TRUST

The Albert Coates Memorial Trust is a volunteer-run, Ballarat-based organisation which, since 1998, has raised funds to present scholarships for medical purposes, with a strong emphasis on regional areas. The scholarships are awarded in areas of interest and relevance to the life and achievements of Sir Albert Coates, the Ballarat-born surgeon of the Thai-Burma Railway.

During World War 1, Albert Coates served in Gallipoli, Egypt and Flanders as a medical orderly and with the Intelligence Corps. At 46 he volunteered for duty in World War II and went as Senior Surgeon with the 2/10th AGH of the 8th Division to Malaya. Captured by the Japanese in Sumatra he was taken to Burma. As a surgeon on the infamous Thai-Burma railway, he saved hundreds of lives and gave inspired leadership to those with whom he served.



REPORT FROM THE CHAIR



DON MOSS FRACS FACS HON CHAIR

The Coates Trust continues to grow, and be successful in its aim to honour the life of Sir Albert Coates, particularly through educational scholarships.

Many may have predicted that the ability to maintain interest in the past achievements of war veterans would fade as the years go by. It has therefore been particularly pleasing to see the huge growth in interest over recent years. The centenary of our involvement in World War 1, at Gallipoli and the Somme, has lead to a surprising number of new books, and in visits to these areas.

Additionally many younger people have developed an interest in military history. It is also pleasing to see the belated recognition of the Vietnam and Korean war veterans, and the acknowledgement of the contributions of our soldiers in more recent international conflicts.

Coates was not a man to glorify war, but his life and enormous contribution to caring for his fellow POWs, deserves his name to be more widely known.

The Trust continues to coordinate with Federation University to run the annual Coates Oration, and the list of orators over the period 2001 to 2015 has been quite extra-ordinary.

For 2015 the orator was Dr. Lachlan Grant, historian of the Military History section of the Australian War Memorial. In addition an annual lunchtime lecture is held, and in March 2016, Hon Robert Knowles AO gave an address on the problem of Bullying in the Professions. Further details of these events will be outlined in this report. Both continue to attract excellent audiences.

The Trust also sponsors a series of scholarships in medical and nursing fields, combining with Melbourne University, the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, and the Department of Health Victoria for nursing scholarships.

In combination with Federation University we award three scholarships in Nursing, the Visual Arts and Biomedical Sciences.

In May 2016, we awarded the first Coates scholarship with the Australian Catholic University (Aquinas Campus, Ballarat) and are working with Notre Dame University to develop a further educational scholarship.

The students from Sir Albert Coates' first school, Mount Pleasant Primary, develop projects on the life of Coates, and this year the prizes were sponsored by funds contributed by members of the Gherardin and Coates' families.

These scholarships would not be possible without the substantial contribution of the Australian Legion funds, administered via the Victorian Veterans' Council. The work of Ted Lynes OAM, who died earlier this year, was hugely important in developing this financial support. We acknowledge his enormous contribution to the Trust since its inauguration. Additional funding support by other sponsors, including the Ballaarat Club and W&D Finance, is listed later in the report.

The Trustees and Committee members continue to work hard to achieve the aims of the Trust. Each member has taken on a role to help, and I am sincerely grateful to them all. Sir Albert Coates, in talking of his POW work, said 'any mug could've done it'. When it comes to the work of Coates Committee members, I simply don't believe it!

SECRETARY'S REPORT



ROGER TRUDGEON MA HON SECRETARY

The past twelve months has seen a significant range of activities accompanied by a number of important administrative developments, helping the Trust to operate smoothly and adhere to regulatory requirements. Membership of the trustees of the Coates Trust has remained the same through 2015/2016, continuing into the next financial year also. Don Moss continues as Chair of the Trustees and the committee, with Bruce Clark as Treasurer and Roger Trudgeon as Secretary. Marie Pryor and Rudy Novotny are continuing as Trustees.

Members of the Trust met with the Veterans' Branch of the Department of Premier and Cabinet to work through matters of mutual interest in our relationship with the Victorian Veterans' Council (VVC). The Coates Trust receives the majority of its funds through the VVC and the meeting ensures that the council is kept informed about the allocation of the funds provided by the Australian Legion of ExService Men and Women which are invested through the VVC.

Negotiations for a new award at the Australian Catholic University, Aquinas Campus in Ballarat were successfully concluded, with the first scholarship awarded in May, 2016. The scholarship is for a second year Nursing/Paramedic student and is designed to help cover the costs of their practical placement conducted in year two of the course. Negotiations for a further new scholarship to be offered by Notre Dame University were also commenced for Victorian medical students enrolled in programs based in Ballarat.

The Coates Trust is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission (ACNC) and complies with the various annual reporting requirements. Reporting is submitted online by the secretary, including financial reports and details of the Trust's administrative changes and activities.

A major project during the year continues to be the Mount Pleasant Primary School Year Six projects. This culminated in 2015 in an exhibition at the Gold Museum in December/January. The projects were remarkable in their creativity and use of artistic and technological skills. In addition to the two prizes for the best projects, sponsored by the Gherardin family, a kind donation by Arthur and Robyn Coates enabled two extra runners-up prizes.

The Trust is grateful for the range of financial and in-kind support received in providing its program of scholarships and associated activities. thank the Australian Legion of Ex-Service Men and Women for their generous financial contribution which funds the majority of the We acknowledge the practical scholarships. support of the Victorian Veterans' Council in managing those funds. Federation University Australia, the University of Melbourne and the Australian Catholic University provide financial and in-kind support of Trust related events and programs, for which we are most grateful. W&D Finance and the Ballaarat Club both provide very welcome funds for scholarship awards. Individual donors provide much needed support to help us maintain the value of scholarships.

My thanks to the members of the Coates Trust committee for their on-going practical support of the work and activities of the Trust. Thanks to Sam Maskell and Crowe Horwath for auditing the Trust's accounts. I acknowledge with thanks the extensive range of work carried out by Elizabeth Trudgeon in designing posters, fliers, invitations, exhibition and information panels and other administrative support. Thanks also to Ballarat Legacy for providing a meeting place for the Trust, to Alison Freeman for catering services and High Tech Printing for all its support.



TREASURER'S REPORT

It is noted that the Trust carries forward into the new financial year a \$28,737 scholarship funding reserve which is an important cash flow requirement. The scholarship allocations commence in September and the major annual income items fall into the October/November time frame.

The Albert Coates Memorial Trust appreciated greatly the very important donations received during the financial year 2015 - 2016 from the major donors and many individual supporters of the Trust.

In particular, the Trust appreciates the on-going and significant financial support of the Legion of Ex-Service Men and Women in co-operation with the Victorian Veterans' Council.

Importantly, it should be noted that generally low and falling interest rates have negatively impacted on the income the Trust has received and the outlook for 2016 - 2017 is that similar or worse conditions will prevail.





He became Dean of Education at RACS in 2012, a significant role involving surgical education programs and professional development for surgical educators.

Dr Brian Chee, the recipient of the Albert Coates Memorial Prize, said in a letter to the Trust that it was 'a privilege to receive an award named after a man who rose from his humble beginnings, to become the great surgeon and humanitarian that he was. I strongly believe that a good appreciation and knowledge of Anatomy is essential for understanding the various bodily functions and

This is the first year of the **Albert Coates Memorial Trust Scholarship**, which was recently established, at the Australian Catholic University, Aquinas Campus. The scholarship is 'awarded to a student who has achieved academically and has also shown a commitment to the Mission and values of ACU and to community engagement in their local area'. Associate Professor Joe Fleming was Host and Master of Ceremonies. It is an annual award to a second year Nursing/Paramedicine student.

Mark Hocking is the inaugural recipient and is studying for a double degree in nursing and paramedics. The scholarship of \$2500 is to assist with course costs such as expenses incurred with regional placements. Roger Trudgeon (Trust Hon. COATES ORATION AND SCHOLARSHIP PRESENTATION

Federation :

Dr Lachlan Grant, Senior Historian in the Military History Section of the Australian War Memorial presented the 2015 Albert Coates Oration at Federation University, Ballarat, 22nd October 2015. His address was entitled: 'Voices from the Past: recovering memories of the POWs for The Changi Book, 70 years on'.

His address was based around the research and writing of *The Changi Book,* a compilation of reminiscences and stories from Changi POWs, made at the end of the Second World War. The book is an Australian War Memorial publication commemorating the 70th anniversary of the end of the war.

Dt Grant said that many myths persist about the wartime experience of prisoners of the Japanese. These are mostly about the horrific conditions on the Burma - Thailand Railway.

Of the 22,000 Australians to become prisoners of the Japanese, one third died in captivity. However, of the estimated 87,000 Allied prisoners who passed through Changi 850 died there.

Changi was a complex located on the north-eastern tip of Singapore Island and made up of villages, woodlands and military barracks built by the British in the 1930s.

The British and Australians there were mostly under the control of their officers.

He finished by saying: 'Seventy years on, as an historian, I feel indebted to these men and women who kept a record of their wartime experiences - so we can understand, interpret and share for future generations.'

LUNCH WITH SPEAKER

On Wednesday, March 16th, the Trust held a most successful luncheon. The Hon. Rob Knowles AO chaired the inquiry, set up in March 2015, into the issues surrounding bullying and sexual harassment conducted for the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, (RACS.) Rob Knowles is a former Victorian Health Minister and current Chair of the Board of the Royal Children's Hospital and has represented the Ballarat Province as Minister for Housing & Aged Care (1992-1996).



Roger Mitchell gave a vote of thanks to the speaker on behalf of the Trust

He gave a presentation on 'Bullying in the Professions'. He spoke of the results of the survey of surgeons and trainees which highlighted the prevalence of the issue of bullying. He also reflected on the frequency of the problem in other workplaces, as often highlighted in the media. He pointed out the need for a broad cultural change to reject this behaviour, and of some steps the RACS has taken to achieve effective change. Many of the bullying personalities did not appear to understand the consequences of their attitudes, and often became defensive when questioned. His talk was challenging, and created much interest.

Surgical Elective Report

In Ophthalmology

I spent the month of January 2016 in the specialty area of Ophthalmology for my clinical elective in surgery. I was able to observe and practice in preoperative and post-operative cataract care, and diagnosis consultation, patient education and management of

chronic eye conditions. My elective exposed me to specialty surgical practice in both public and private hospitals and private clinical settings.

In the clinic I saw many patients being managed indefinitely for common chronic conditions of the eye with the occasional patient presenting with a rarer condition and other things not generally seen in more general practices. I was taught how to manage common conditions well, and excited by the rarer pathologies to learn about those.

This elective allowed me to practice specific skills like how to operate a slit lamp, using an ophthalmoscope to examine the retina and performing tonometry for intraocular pressures. It was very useful to become comfortable describing the appearance of crucial parts of anatomy like the optic nerve head, the macula and surrounding retina because these areas have huge variation in appearances when affected by disease processes.

What I found quite remarkable was being able to attend the theatre for operations that my supervisor did visiting my home-town where I lived for 20 years, where I didn't realise such speciality fields were available for local patients.

One of the best parts about doing this elective was being able to see the specialist services that are offered in rural and regional communities. It gave me realistic expectations of my goals for my career which I will continue to work towards for the remainder of my studies and has provided me with the motivation to continue to do this.

Thank you to the Sir (Albert) Coates committee for providing not only the scholarship as a monetary support to get maximum benefit from my surgical elective but the recognition of receiving this award which I have found

OVER 100 SCHOLARSHIPS

Over the past eighteen years the Albert Coates Memorial Trust has awarded more than 100 scholarships and awards. For its first three years the Trust was focussed on raising funds to create the permanent memorial to Coates which has been located in Sturt Street Ballarat since 2000. Once Louis Laumen's powerful sculpture of Coates as a POW on the Thai-Burma Railway was achieved, the Trust wanted to shift its attention to what were called 'living memorials' in the form of providing support to regional and rural students mainly connected with health and medical courses that were dear to the heart of Sir Albert Coates. The Trust's first support for tertiary students commenced in 2001 with the award in the Graduate Diploma in Surgical Anatomy (University of Melbourne/Royal Australasian College of Surgeons).

In 2003, the Trust commenced a series of awards with Federation University Australia (then called the University of Ballarat) firstly in the School of Nursing and in successive years, Visual Arts (2004 to present) and Engineering (2004-2008) and from 2011, the Biomedical Science Scholarship, sponsored by W&D Finance. Also from 2011, the University of Melbourne Rural Clinical School has offered a Coates scholarship for rural medical students to assist them with placements.

A new nursing/paramedics scholarship commenced in 2016 at the Australian Catholic University, with another in the pipeline with Notre Dame University in 2016/2017.

From 2003 the Trust began a continuing and greatly valued association with Albert Coates' old school, Mount Pleasant Primary School. Each year students from Year 6 participate in a voluntary Coates project with prizes awarded for the best projects.

The original awards took the form of book prizes and small sums of money. Following years of steady fund raising the Trust was able to increase the value of the scholarships. The most significant boost occurred in 2006 when the Australian Legion of Ex-Service Men and Women entrusted a large endowment fund through the Victorian Veterans' Council, with funds generated each year benefiting the Coates Trust. Awards now range from \$300 to \$10,000 depending on the courses involved. Scholarship funds are struggling now to keep up due to low interest rates, so the challenge to build our reserve funds is as great as ever. The Coates Trust is very grateful to the sponsors, donors and partners who support the growing scholarship program.
