REPORT FROM THE CHAIRMAN - DON MOSS OAM FRACS FACS

The Albert Coates Memorial Trust was formed some 20 years ago, to honour the life of a Ballarat son, who contributed much during his life.

He served in both World Wars, but was especially notable for his service as surgeon to the POWs on the Burma Thailand Railway over the period 1942-45.

On return to Australia, Coates was a senior surgeon at Royal Melbourne Hospital and community contributor in many ways.

He was never one to glorify war service, but it remains important that the contributions of the many who served are remembered gratefully. It is pleasing therefore to see the continued growth in numbers of the public attending memorial events such as ANZAC Day services, and visiting overseas sights such as the Western Front, Gallipoli, and Thailand.

This was perhaps enhanced by the commemorative events in 2018 relating to the end of World War I in Europe in 1918, but the numbers continue to grow.

Notable also, are the groups of families, with parents explaining to their children the contributions of their ancestors to the future safety of this country.

The recognition of those who served in later wars, and in peace-keeping operations overseas, has certainly improved since the return of Vietnam veterans.

Albert Coates was not as well-known as he should be, but the Trust continues to work to correct this oversight. The programme of scholarships supporting future doctors, nurses and paramedics has led many students and educators to learn of his contributions.

We depend on donor support, especially by the Australian Legion, an ex-servicemen's organization.

Additional donors and new scholarships are listed elsewhere in this annual report.

In November 2019, the Sir Albert Coates Oration was presented by Sir Angus Houston AK AFC (Ret'd). Sir Angus retired as Air Chief Marshall and Chief of the Defence Force 2005-2011, with additional service during the national responses to the MH370 and MH17 disasters. Appropriately he spoke on "Leadership Matters" and outlined five leadership principles that he feels are crucial.

The annual luncheon address in May, was given by Dr Misty Jenkins PhD, Ballarat born, but now a leading researcher at the Walter Eliza Hall Institute for Medical Research. It was an exciting insight into developing treatment possibilities for immunotherapy to treat brain cancer (glioma). A woman to watch!

The committee members contribute in many ways, with absolutely minimal administration costs.

I remain hugely grateful to them all, as this strong scholarship programme in recognition of the contributions of Sir Albert Coates, could not function successfully without them.

I feel sure that Coates would be delighted by the educational support to the next generation of health workers and university students.

He would want us to make a difference!

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The past year has seen the inaugural scholarship presented to Justin Galvin, a Deakin University medical student.

Ten other students received scholarships at five different universities and one student through the Department of Health Victoria.

Extensive work has been conducted with Ballarat Health Services on a new scholarship funded through a major donation from the Leckie Family. The new scholarship will support Special Care Nursing Training for nurses caring for premature and unwell babies. The scholarship program will be launched later in 2019.

At the AGM of the trustees of the Coates Trust, Neil Shiells was elected to replace the position held by the late Bruce Clark. Rudy Novotny was elected as Treasurer and Neil Shiells as Assistant Treasurer. Don Moss was re-elected as Chairperson, Roger Trudgeon as Secretary and Shirley McIver as a Trustee.

Membership of the Coates Trust Committee remained the same as for the previous year.



TREASURER'S REPORT - 2018-19

In the ongoing low interest-bearing financial climate, the ACMT is pleased to report a good performance in relation to Income, Equity and Scholarships granted during 2018-19.

Although earnings from investment income are always an important factor the Trust is managing its investments with a low to moderate risk factor, and periodic reviews.

Please refer to the following Tables, Charts, Comparisons and the Financial Audit Report for specifics financial details for the financial year. It is noted that the Income for 2018-19 is 41% lower than the previous year, this is entirely due one exceptionally large donation of \$50,000 last Year.

Conversely it is reported that Scholarships awarded for the Financial Year at \$43,060 are 49% higher than the previous Year! This is due to Scholarships increasing and also timing slippage, at the Financial year change-over.

For the Financial Year the Equity of the Trust is up by 6.8%.

All Donations received during the year are gratefully acknowledged!
These were numerous and significant.

In particular the Trust acknowledges the ongoing support of the Legion of ex-Service Men and Woman through the Victorian Veterans Council.

Furthermore, it is appropriate to highlight a \$10,000 donation from the Glenyis McIver Trust.

The Trust has a Scholarship carryover of \$67,593 into the new financial year.

Negotiations are well advanced for a new "Leckie Estate" Scholarship.

Both the Oration and the Luncheon functions have again been financially rewarding.

Our reporting responsibilities with the ATO, Australian Charities and Not- for -profit Commission and the Victorian Veterans Council (Legion) are all up to date.

It is appropriate to thank Sam Maskell CPA for making himself available, on a voluntary basis.







lan Taylor, like Albert Coates, became a senior surgeon at Royal Melbourne Hospital, and retained his close contacts with the anatomy school.

His address emphasised the importance of anatomical knowledge and research in the advances in surgical techniques that have occurred in recent years.

Sir Albert Coates Oration 2018 Air Chief Marshal Sir Angus Houston AK, AFC (Ret'd)

The Coates Oration is sponsored by Federation University Australia in association with the Albert Coates Memorial Trust.

This year the Oration was delivered by Air Chief Marshal Sir Angus Houston AK, AFC (Ret'd) .

The audience gathered at Federation University Ballarat on 13th November and we were welcomed by Dr Sam Henson' Head of Campus, before Prof,

Helen Bartlett, Vice Chancellor, introduced Sir Angus who had chosen for his subject, "Leadership Matter",

Sir Angus had had no knowledge of Albert Coates prior to accepting the invitation to speak, but following research, realised how many of the fundamental elements of leadership Coates had displayed, so there were frequent returns to Sir Albert's life throughout his address.

Here are a few quotes from what he shared. "Leadership is the lifeblood of any entity or team" "Failures of leadership have profound and difficult consequences. Conversely, excellent leadership is fundamental to achieving and sustaining success." His five leadership principles are:

Provide clear direction

"The 'vision' needs to be articulated and communicated again and again."

Establish and maintain the right culture

"It is important to recognise that culture is not static but is ever changing."

Commitment to Leadership

"Leaders need to exemplify the values defined by their organisation or team."

Communication again and again

"Speak from the heart to connect with your people."

Constructive relationships

"In establishing your key relationships as a leader, you should be seeking constructive, cooperative and collaborative relationships which are highlighted by strong rapport and high levels of trust."

"You need relationships with the five Cs. Good communication, good co-operation, a lot of consultation, a lot of co-ordination and finally, a lot of collaboration."

Sir Angus illustrated the application of these principles using examples from his own leadership when dealing with issues and responsibilities in the various position he has held.

Finally he assured us that he would make it a priority to tell others about the life and work of Coates.

Sir Angus Houston - **Some Biographical Information** He was born in Scotland and emigrated to Australia and worked as a jackaroo in W.A. He was accepted into the Airforce and trained as a pilot. He served in Papua New Guinea and Indonesia and later has had postings in Singapore, USA and Australia.

After further study he was posted to the Joint Operations staff at Headquarters Australian Defence Force and was involved in strategic planning during the Persian Gulf War of 1990–1991. He was appointed as Chief of Air Force (CAF) in 2001. In 2005, he was promoted to Air Chief Marshal and in 2008 was appointed Chief of the Defence Force.

In retirement he has served in many roles, one of the most widely known being the oversight of the efforts to find Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 that has been missing since 2014.

He is currently the Chancellor of the University of the Sunshine Coast.

Sir Angus is a Knight of the Order of Australia

Luncheon with Dr Misty Jenkins 3rd May 2019

About eighty people gathered at the Ballarat Golf Club, in March, for 'Our lunch with the Speaker', to hear Dr Misty Jenkins speak of her research work at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute.

Dr Jenkins heads an immunology laboratory at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research in Melbourne and, with her team, is working toward finding a cure for brain cancer.

Misty was born in Ballarat and attended Mt Clear Secondary College and then the University of Melbourne, followed by post graduate studies at Oxford and Cambridge Universities.

She was the first person in her family to attend university; a huge step for her being an indigenous student - she believes she probably was the first Australian Indigenous woman to study at the English Universities.

Misty holds a PhD in Microbiology and Immunology

Misty was entertaining as she told stories of her life.

As a youngster, she was probably labelled as a 'nerd' when she joined the St John's Ambulance Brigade and entered its competitions rather than play sport.

She was always interested in how the human body worked and wondered why various parts reacted in the way they did when she was ill.

During her Science degree studies she developed an interest in immunology and very boldly wrote to Professor Peter Doherty, a Nobel Prize winner, and indicated her eagerness to learn more with him as her mentor.

He obviously recognized her talents and along

with Professor Steve Turner, mentored her in her studies for several years.

During her studies, Misty was interested in T- cell immunity and understanding how white blood cells kill things in the body.

Now in her research, she is working on understanding how T-cells kill cancer through manipulating or engineering T- cells with the weapons they need to kill brain tumours.

Quoting from Dr Jenkins's website:

Our research focusses on a type of adoptive T cell immunotherapy called Chimeric Antigen Receptor T cell (CAR T cell) therapy. (See graphic below) CAR T cells are engineered from a patient's own T cell, to recognize and attack cancer cells. We are designing and testing CAR T cells directed against adult and paediatric brain tumours.


We are also investigating how to best activate T cells to allow for tailored immune responses to solid tumours.

The biological understanding and development of new immunotherapies has undergone a revolution in the past decade.

Our research will provide insights into T cell biology and we anticipate that our research will ultimately reveal enhanced strategies for targeting tumour antigens in the brain, to treat patients clinically.

Misty was an excellent speaker and attendees were fascinated in her topic. Arthur Coates and Don Moss thanked her on behalf of all present.


