

#### 2018 Scholarships

This year the Trust will distribute a growing number of tertiary level scholarships across several different universities.

<u>Albert Coates/Australian Legion of Ex Service Men</u> <u>& Women, Australian Catholic University, Ballarat</u> 2018

Recipient: Kimberley Morris-Flynn Scholarship: \$2,500

A scholarship of \$2,500 to assist second year students of nursing and paramedics with costs incurred in their professional practice placement at the end of the year.

Kimberly Morris-Flynn is a 2<sup>nd</sup> year student in the Bachelor of Nursing/Bachelor of Paramedicine in the ACU Ballarat campus. She is a volunteer CFA fire-fighter, and has worked as a 1<sup>st</sup> responder Paramedics at the Victorian Emergency phone centre. Her maternal grandfather was a veteran on the Kokoda trail in WW2.

Kimberly is keen to complete her training, and hopes to work long-term in a regional area.

#### **University of Notre Dame**

Recipient: Ariah Steel Scholarship: \$2,500

Ariah Steel is a current medical student studying in the Ballarat Clinical School. Her elective involves her working in the Gove district hospital in Arnhem Land, Northern Territory, serving the local indigenous community. ## Lunch with speaker Judge Sara Hinchey

Judge Hinchey returned to her original home town to give a lunchtime talk for the Coates Trust on May 1. She was eloquent, informative and entertaining to the large audience, that included many from the medical/nursing and legal professions.

Of the 45,000 deaths in Victoria each year, some 6500 are reported to the Coroner's office. Judge Hinchey explained the role of the state's 10 coroners, to ascertain certain facts about the death, and make recommendations which may prevent similar deaths in the future.

Of the total deaths reviewed, most are finalised by investigation and a written finding. Only 100 lead to a full inquest. Of the whole, 40% are "natural deaths", 33% the result of accidents, suicides 11%, medical/surgical complications 5%, other causes 10% and only 1% are homicides.

Judge Hinchey also outlined the results of the review of heroin overdose deaths that lead to the recommendation for a medically supervised injecting facility.

Her talk was well received and clarified the important role of the Coroner in our community.

## University of Melbourne/Royal Australasian College of Surgeons Coates' scholarship in Anatomy for 2018

The presentation of certificates for completion of the Graduate Diploma in Surgical Anatomy was held on 3 September at University House, Melbourne.

Some 97 students completed the course for 2018, as the course continues to attract marked interest. Sir Albert Coates was strongly involved in teaching anatomy at the University, as James Stewart lecturer in anatomy and acting Professor of Anatomy, early in his medical career. He would be delighted in the resurrection of interest in the subject.


The occasional address was delivered by Professor G Ian Taylor, a world authority in free vascularized grafts. Ian emphasized the role that knowledge of vascular anatomy had played in the use of free grafts in many areas of reconstructive/plastic surgery.

Below L: Don Moss, Dr Sam Digby, Prof. G Ian Taylor, Roger Trudgeon. R: Prof Ian Taylor.










When Albert Coates was 14 he was fortunate to join the Ballarat Litho and Printing Company and indentured as a book binder at six shillings a week. He learnt the skills of printing and bookbinding. This allowed him to attend a night school set up by Leslie Morshead, a teacher at Mount Pleasant PS, and to eventually gain five distinctions in the 1913 Junior Public Examination which qualified him for enrolment at Melbourne University. At the printing works Albert was often to be found reading the books that had been left for binding.
