Deakin University 2023

From a strong list of applicants, two awards were made to Deakin University students for 2023. Each award is for \$2500.

The Leckie Scholarship Awards 2023

Three nursing students at Grampians Health Ballarat were awarded scholarships for 2023.

Manja Jose was awarded \$2550 towards her studies for the Master of Health (Neonatal Care) at Federation University.

Belinda Howlett and **Casey Moore** were each awarded \$2550 to go toward their study for the Graduate Diploma of Health (Neonatal Care) at Federation University.

In addition Casey was granted an additional \$1000 for her IT expenses.

The Leckie scholarships awarded, on behalf of the Albert Coates Memorial Trust, are all contributing to the expansion of Neonatal Nursing at Grampians Health Ballarat.

Regional Emergency Nursing - Hume Region

This year applicants from the Hume Region of Victoria applied for Rural Emergency Nursing Awards.

In total, there are nineteen publicly funded health services in the Hume region, stretching from Seymour to Corryong and across to Albury-Wodonga.

Goulburn Valley Health (Regional City of Shepparton), Albury-Wodonga Health and Northeast Health Wangaratta all operate emergency departments.

Four awards were made.

- * Kevin Okumu from North East Health, Wangaratta awarded \$2000 - Kevin is currently a Unit Manager at Wangaratta and is studying for a Graduate Certificate in Critical Care Nursing at the University of Melbourne and hopes to be a nurse practitioner in critical care nursing.
- * Gurjit Sangha from North East Health, Wangaratta awarded \$6000 works in the

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Emergency Department and is studying for a Graduate Certificate in Critical Care Nursing at the University of Melbourne and hopes to gain in depth theoretical knowledge and nursing skills to provide best possible care to acutely ill patients

- * Stephanie Vick from Goulburn Valley Health, Shepparton awarded \$4000 is the associate nurse manager of the critical care unit and is studying for a Master of Advanced Nursing practice at University of Melbourne she wants to develop critical thinking skills required to practise safely and effectively in the ED and CCU settings and to contribute and work collaboratively in a multi-disciplinary team.
- * William Wallace from North East Health, Wangaratta awarded \$4000 currently working in the Emergency Department and is studying for a Master of Advanced Nursing practice at the University of Melbourne he hopes to have the enthusiasm and commitment to investigate means to improve inter-service collaboration within the region.

Australian Catholic University Nursing/Paramedicine

Chloe Charnstrom was the ACU awardee for 2023.

Chloe comes from a single parent family, and her mother is now wheelchair bound, after multiple cancer treatments.



Chloe does much of her mother's care, in addition to her ACU University training for her Nursing/Paramedicine career.

She has also undertaken part-time work as a PCA in aged care.

Both her grandfathers served in WW2. The award is valued at \$2500.

Mt Pleasant Primary School Awards

Each year the ACMT gives monetary awards to several year 6 students at Mt Pleasant PS, who complete projects concerning Sir Albert Coates, a former student of their school.

These are made possible through the generosity of the Sebastopol Bowling Club and Arthur and Robyn Coates. Shirley McIver and Robyn Coates met with the children prior to them beginning their projects, with Robyn presenting a PowerPoint presentation on the life of Albert Coates followed by many questions from the children.

Each child was given a handout to take home to their family, to give some background, on the life of Albert Coates and perhaps extend the family's knowledge.

Using resources from a "Museum in a Suitcase", developed by Elizabeth and Roger Trudgeon, the children prepared their projects, using various forms of media, with support from their teachers Mrs Dean and Mrs Lacny.

Each of the students presented their projects to Shirley McIver and Robyn and Arthur Coates - they had a very good knowledge of Albert Coates and their projects were creative and well prepared. They included a diorama, games, computer presentations using Minecraft, PowerPoint presentations and posters.



Awards were presented at the Graduation ceremony, in December, by Trustee Shirley McIver, with all children who participated receiving a copy of "Glimpses of Sir Albert Coates" and the four prize winners receiving monetary awards.

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NAMING OF FORECOURT AND GARDEN AT AMA BUILDING IN PARKVILLE

April 24th was a beautiful autumn morning when over 60 invited guests crowded into the forecourt of the AMA building, in Royal Parade, to name it in honour of Sir Albert Coates and to similarly name a garden in honour of Sir Rupert Downes.



The AMA Heritage and Archive Committee (HAC) is working to acknowledge the contribution of past presidents, and this was another step.

We were welcomed by Dr Gerald Segal, Chair of the HAC, before **Andrew Coates**, Albert's grandson, had eight minutes to summarise Albert's life and achievements. He did it excellently.

I was allotted five minutes to give a summary of the formation of the ACMT, its operation, and its on-going work. As I said on the day, "The first big task was to raise \$100 000.00 to erect a statue in Sturt Street. The money was raised, and the statue unveiled in the year 2000. This was before my involvement, but I think it was an enormous achievement."

I hope I conveyed the importance of our work today where fund raising continues and many scholarships are awarded; that all members of the Trust are volunteers and expenses are kept to a minimum; and hopefully the Trust's work will continue long into the future.

Mrs Susan Grant, the granddaughter of Rupert Downes, told us about his life and contribution. As the majority of guests were Albert's family and supporters of the Trust, we knew little about him, hence were very interested.

Rupert Downes was born in in Adelaide, in 1885, but resided in Malvern and was educated in Victoria.

He was a surgeon, academic, army medical officer and military historian. He served in the first World War, firstly at Gallipoli.

After the withdrawal from there, he was appointed Assistant Director of Medical Services (ADMS) of the newly formed Anzac Mounted Division. The rest of his service then is a fascinating story in itself.

During the inter-war years, he worked in most major Melbourne hospitals, was instrumental in establishing the Commonwealth Serum Laboratories, was chairman of the Red Cross National Council, Victorian State Commissioner of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, president of the St John Ambulance Association and chairman of the Victorian Civil Ambulance

He became the Army's most senior medical officer.

In 1935, he became President of the Victorian branch of the AMA, known then as British Medical Association.

After the Munich Crisis in 1938, he like many, believed that another war was imminent, so he toured military and other medical centres around much of the world.

As war broke out, he campaigned with some success for the establishment of major military hospitals in the state capital cities.

What followed, was five more years of military service.

His life was cut short in a plane crash near Cairns in 1945.
